

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In 1943, Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia and City Council President Newbold Morris established New York City Center, Manhattan's first performing arts center, as a place where dance, theater, opera, and music could all be enjoyed under one roof-bringing the performing arts to all New Yorkers at affordable prices.

Today, the distinctive neo-Moorish theater welcomes over 300,000 annual visitors to experience dynamic performances, studio events, master classes, and art exhibitions-matched by education and community engagement programs that bring the performing arts to over 11,000 New York City students, teachers, and families each year. City Center remains committed to supporting

artists during this crucial time, celebrating the resilience of the arts and its power to bring us together.

MEET THE ARTISTS

AUDRA MCDONALD is unparalleled in the breadth and versatility of her artistry as both a singer and an actor. The winner of a recordbreaking six Tony Awards, two Grammy Awards, and an Emmy, in 2015 she was named one of Time magazine's 100 most influential people and received a National Medal of Arts-America's highest honor for achievement in the field-from President Barack Obama. In addition to her Tony-winning performances in Carousel, Master Class, Ragtime, A Raisin in the Sun, The Gershwins' Porgy and Bess, and Lady Day at Emerson's Bar & Grill—the role that also served as the vehicle for her 2017 debut in London's West End (2018 Olivier Award nomination)—she has appeared on Broadway in The Secret Garden, Marie Christine (Tony nomination), Henry IV, 110 in the Shade (Tony nomination), Shuffle Along, or, The Making of the Musical Sensation of 1921 and All That Followed, and Frankie and Johnny in the Clair de Lune (Tony nomination). A Juilliard-trained soprano, her opera credits include La voix humaine and Send at Houston Grand Opera, and Rise and Fall of the City of Mahagonny at Los Angeles Opera, where the resulting recording earned her two Grammy Awards.

On television, she was seen by millions as the Mother Abbess in NBC's The Sound of Music Live! and played Dr. Naomi Bennett on ABC's Private Practice. She won an Emmy Award for her role as host of PBS's Live From Lincoln Centerand has received nominations for Wit, A Raisin in the Sun, and Lady Day at Emerson's Bar & Grill. Having first appeared as Liz Lawrence on CBS's The Good Wife, she can now be seen on CBS All Access's The Good Fight and the upcoming pandemic-themed drama Second Wave. On film, she has appeared in Seven Servants, The Object of My Affection, Cradle Will Rock, It Runs in the Family, The Best Thief in the World, She Got Problems, Rampart, Ricki and the Flash, Disney's live-action Beauty and the Beast, the movie-musical Hello Again, and MGM's Aretha Franklin biopic, Respect, to be released in 2021.

McDonald has released five solo albums on the

Nonesuch label as well as Sing Happy, with the New York Philharmonic, on Decca Gold. She also maintains a major career as a concert artist, regularly appearing on the great stages of the world and with leading international orchestras. A founding member of Black Theatre United, board member of Covenant House International, and prominent advocate for LGBTQAI+ rights, her favorite roles are those performed offstage, as an activist, wife to actor Will Swenson, and mother.

ANDY EINHORN most recently served as the music supervisor and musical director for the Broadway productions of Hello, Dolly! starring Bette Midler and Carousel starring Renée Fleming. Einhorn's previous Broadway music directing and conducting credits include Holiday Inn, Woody Allen's Bullets Over Broadway, Rodgers + Hammerstein's Cinderella, Brief Encounter, and Sondheim on Sondheim. Other Broadway work includes Evita and The Light in the Piazza.

Since 2011, Einhorn has served as music director and pianist for six-time Tony Award winner, Audra McDonald, performing with her at such prestigious orchestras and venues including The New York Philharmonic, Boston Pops at Tanglewood, Philadelphia Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, National Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra at Blossom, Cincinnati Pops, Chicago Symphony at Ravinia, Los Angeles Opera, Carnegie Hall, Walt Disney Concert Hall, and more. He has twice led the New York Philharmonic conducting for Audra McDonald and Chris Botti, respectively.

Recording credits include Audra McDonald's Sing Happy with the New York Philharmonic, Oklahoma (2019 revival, executive producer, Grammy nomination), Carousel featuring Renée Fleming (executive producer, Grammy nomination), Hello Dolly! featuring Bette Midler (Grammy nomination), Bullets Over Broadway, Cinderella, Evita, Sondheim on Sondheim (Grammy nomination), Stage Door Canteen, and McDonald's "Go Back Home." He served as the music director

for HBO's Peabody Award winning documentary "Six by Sondheim" and music supervisor for Great Performances Peabody Award winning special "Broadway Musicals: A Jewish Legacy" on PBS.

Andy Einhorn is an honors graduate of Rice University in Houston, Texas.

Needless to say, when invited to return to New York City Center as the sole live audience member of their digital 2020 Gala starring the incomparable Audra, he was honored and thrilled. She is a magnificent talent, and New York City Center is a magnificent place.

Urie made his City Center Encores! debut in the 2019 production of *High Button Shoes*.

SCOTT LEHRER (Sound Design) received the first Tony awarded to sound for the Lincoln Center Theater revival of South Pacific. Recent theatre work includes King Lear, To Kill a Mockingbird, Richard Nelson's The Michaels, Illyria, Gabriel Family Plays at The Public Theater, Hello, Dolly!, The Front Page, Chicago, Shuffle Along, Fiddler on the Roof, Dames at Sea, The King and I, Living on Love, Honeymoon in Vegas, A Delicate Balance, A Raisin in the Sun, Lucky Guy, Chaplin (Drama Desk Award), and Mike Nichols' productions of Death of a Salesman and Betrayal. He has also designed over 50 New York City Center Encores!. Recording projects include the Broadway cast recording of An American in Paris (Grammy nomination), Loudon Wainwright III's Grammywinning High Wide & Handsome, Bebe Neuwirth's Porcelain, and Meredith Monk's Mercy. A graduate of Sarah Lawrence College, he was faculty at Bennington College from 2001 until 2013 and now teaches at Hunter College.

MEET THE ARTISTS

NEW YORK CITY CENTER has played a defining role in the cultural life of the city since 1943 when it was founded by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia with the mission to make the best in the performing arts accessible to all. The distinctive neo-Moorish theater welcomes 300,000 visitors annually to experience internationally acclaimed artists on the same stage where legends like George Balanchine, Leonard Bernstein, Barbara Cook, José Ferrer, Martha Graham, and Paul Robeson made their mark. For over 25 years, the treasured, Tony-honored Encores! series has given new life to the American musical theater canon, complemented in recent years by the Encores! Off-Center series, which brings today's innovative artists into contact with groundbreaking musicals from the more recent past. Dance continues to be an integral part of the institution's mission through programs like the annual Fall for Dance Festival, which exposes new audiences to an international array of artists by offering subsidized tickets. Through its robust education and community programs, City Center brings the performing arts to over 11,000 New York City students, teachers, and families each year and activates all areas of the building with talks, master classes, art exhibitions, and intimate performances that provide audiences an up-close look at the work of the great theater and dance artists of our time.

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
